A LAMB'S CHRISTMAS POEM ☆

Children create a lovable lamb, complete with a poem, to remind them of the wonderful birth of Jesus.

TOPICS:

Birth of Jesus, Christmas, Hope, Shepherd

MATERIALS:

A Lamb's Christmas Poem [PDF] Click here

5 Cotton Balls per child Glue stick or white glue Black construction paper Safety scissors, white crayon or piece of chalk

DURATION:

Approximately 15 minutes

PREPARATION:

Print and cutout a Lamb's Christmas Poem for each child. Cut black construction paper in half, so that each child will have half a sheet.

WHAT YOU WILL SAY:

Today we are going to create a card to remind us of the wonderful birth of Jesus.

WHAT YOU WILL DO:

- 1. Instruct children to use their white crayon to trace their hand on the black half sheet of construction paper vertically with their fingers spread out facing towards the bottom of the page.
- 2. Instruct children to glue the poem on the back of the black sheet of construction paper.
- 3. Tell students to spread out the cotton balls and glue them to the "palm" of their hand layouts making the body of the sheep nice and fluffy.
- 4. Have kids draw eyes and hoofs on the hand with white crayon.
- 5. Have each child write his or her name 's Lamb
- 6. Read the poem aloud as a class a few times.

BIBLE VERSE (5 MINUTES)

"But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Luke 2:10 NIV Discuss how the shepherds fear turned to joy and then recite the verse several times as a class.

BIBLE STORY (15 MINUTES)

Introduction:

Today we are going to continue talking about some of the people that were part of the Christmas story. The Christmas story is all about the birth of Jesus Christ and it is one of the most important stories in the Bible! When we read from the book of Luke, he tells us details about some Shepherds and how they were part of the story of Jesus' birth. The Shepherds were out in a field taking care of their sheep when suddenly an Angel appeared and announced the birth of Jesus. They dropped everything to go and see this amazing thing that had happened and then they joyfully told others about it as well! Let's listen to the story unfold.

Read Luke 2:6-21

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What were the shepherd doing that night? (Watching their flocks.)
- 2. When the shepherd saw the angels and the glorious light around them how did they feel? (Terrified.)
- 3. What command did the angel give? (Do not be afraid.)
- 4. What did the shepherds do after the heard the angels' news? (They hurried off to find Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.)
- 5. After the shepherds saw Jesus, what did that do? (They spread the word about what the angels told them.)
- 6. After the shepherds returned, what did they do? (They praised God.)

Approximately 5 minutes


SONG LYRICS

SPREAD THE LIGHT ☆

In this activity, children will discover the story of how the world became a dark place. They will learn Jesus came to be the Light of the World and how we, as followers of Jesus, must share the light to give hope to others.

TOPICS:

Birth of Jesus, Christmas, Evangelism, Hope, Light, Sin

MATERIALS:

1 Strong Flashlight, 5 smaller flashlights Glow in the dark stars Optional: Blacklight


DURATION:

Approximately 10 minutes

PREPARATION:

Gather supplies. Practice charging time for glow objects with the flashlights. If used, position the backlight for the highest glow impact.





People lived in this darkness for hundreds of years. They were separated from God and had to go to the temple to visit special priests to make things right with God and be forgiven for the bad choices that they had made. When Jesus came into the world a bright star appeared in the sky. When He was born, there was not just an actual star in the sky, but rather Jesus the Light of the World was born. (*Turn on the flashlight*). Jesus was called the light of the world because He brought something into the world that people had not had for a long time—hope.

This beautiful bright star caused the Wisemen to seek Him. Wisemen traveled far and presented Him with beautiful gifts—but this took a long time for them to find Him. Some people who study the Bible think Jesus might have been two or three years old when the Wisemen visited. You can bet the Wisemen told other scholars about their encounter with Jesus. (Take 2 smaller flashlights and allow children to shine them on 4 or 5 stars to "charge them" for 20 seconds.)

The Shepherds ran to find Jesus as soon as the Angels told them of His birth. (*Take another small flashlight and place it on a glow star*). When the shepherds found Jesus they were filled with joy. They were so excited and passionate about what they saw they ran to tell everyone they came across about the Good News in the birth of Jesus. (*Take 2 smaller flashlights and allow children to shine them on 4 or 5 stars to "charge them" for 20 seconds or so.*) You see, the more people that find out about Jesus, the less dark our world becomes. And now that you know about Him—you too need to share the Good News that Jesus came down to save us from our sin so that one day we can be with God in heaven. He changed the world and brought hope of heaven to this dark world. We must learn from the shepherds and spread the light (*Remove flashlights from stars and let the room shine*). Let's wipe out the darkness and share the news about Jesus! (*Turn on the blacklight or room lights back on.*)
